RAVSAK Forms Strategic Partnership with Areyvut

Started in September 2002, Areyvut is an organization that seeks to formally integrate the values of chesed, tzedakah and tikkun olam into the world of Jewish education. To best accomplish this goal, Areyvut seeks to partner with administrators and educators of Jewish schools, to create programs and projects that best cater to each school's specific needs and interests. Areyvut reaches out to Jewish day schools and congregational schools of all denominations, in the belief that the transmission of these fundamental Jewish values to our children will benefit all lews alike.

Areyvut is currently working with the Hillel Academy of Fairfield, Connecticut and the Solomon Schechter School of Westchester, New York. Areyvut has provided tailor-made programs for each school, including a staff-training workshop for both Judaic and general studies teachers on ways of incorporating chesed, tzedakah and tikkun olam in the curriculum. Moreover, Areyvut is facilitating volunteer opportunities for the high school students, and working one-on-one with Bnai Mitzvah to help them find personal and fulfilling chesed and tzedakah projects with which to

mark their milestone. Areyvut has also developed and implemented a Yom Iyun for 5th-8th graders to proactively address the topic of hunger and learn "hands on" how to make a difference. Students organized food drives, as well as researched charitable organizations that combat hunger. Three additional programs are planned through the end of the year.

In addition to working with schools, Areyvut cosponsors with MACHAR a monthly networking event for educators and youth workers involved in chesed projects and service learning. Areyvut believes that to make tikkun olam a core practice of Jewish education, professionals need the opportunity to learn from each other, encourage each other and become a cadre of advocates. Our meetings involve exploration of Jewish and educational ideas, and case presentations of educational opportunities and dilemmas in our work.

No Child Left Behind:



USDE Issues Guidance on Standards and Assessments

The U.S. Department of Education today released a question and answer document offering guidance on the standards and assessments provisions of the No Child Left Behind Act. Key questions relating to private schools include the following:

K-1. Do State academic standards apply to students attending private schools?

No. A State's academic standards do not apply to private schools. They apply to all public schools and public school children in the State, including the public schools and the public school children served under Title I.

K-2. Must States include students attending private schools in their academic assessment systems?

No. States are not required to include private schools, including those whose students receive services under Title I, part A, in their State academic assessment system.

If an LEA provides services to eligible private school students under Title I, part A, the LEA, must, through timely consultation with private school officials, determine how services to eligible private school students will be academically assessed and how the results of that assessment will be used to improve those services.
